YEAR 9 VISIT TO HERTFORD FIRE STATION 10 MAY 2022



A visit to Hertford Fire Station was arranged as part of Hailey Hall's ongoing commitment to support our pupils in their education and possible career pathways when they leave Hailey Hall school (Post 16). Our current Year 9's were taken by school transport to the fire station in Hertford and were met by Watch Commander Michael Spinks of Red Watch and his team of both female and male firefighters.

We were split into two groups and were shown the on-call Fire tender, and all of the amazing equipment it carries.

Pupils were allowed to see the various tools used, and have the chance to handle them and see how much each item weighed. They also saw a command van used at major incidents.

The highlight of the visit was having various hoses attached to the Fire tender, fixed to the fire hydrant, and seeing how quickly and efficiently the team worked together to be ready in a short time. Our boys were able to hold an actual fire hose and, with the support of a firefighter, were shown how to hold and use a fire hose correctly and safely, spraying gallons of water over an imaginary fire.

We saw how powerful and heavy a hose was and how it was used properly. Each pupil had a go, and



in some cases, keen pupils got extra goes.

I informed the boys that an ex-pupil of Hailey Hall, who had left some two years ago, had attended Herts Regional College on a 'Uniform Services course'. Having spoken to the pupil's dad recently it appears that his son is starting his second year on the course and is still keen to join the fire service.

The pupils got the chance to ask questions of the firefighters regarding being a firefighter and engaged respectfully and appropriately. They were a credit to Hailey Hall school.

As part of Hailey Hall's ongoing commitment to supporting our pupils in their education and career pathways, I had arranged for our Year 10 pupils to attend the Spotlight Rooms in Broxbourne. This was the first time in two years, and in association with the local careers Hub, a careers fair was able to take place.

We used this occasion to travel to the venue by local 310 Arriva bus and for pupils to improve on their travel training skills. They thoroughly enjoyed this opportunity.

On arrival to the Spotlight rooms we were met by the Mayor of Broxbourne, Mr Paul Seeby, who enjoyed talking to our pupils and, as a result, invited the pupils to visit him at the Mayor's Chamber at Broxbourne Borough offices next year. I will be arranging this visit in due course.

We were given the first time slot of the day. The main hall had been set up with numerous employers from the Police, Fire Service, Army, Banking, Law, Hospitality, Finance, Retail, Sport, STEM industries, Apprentices, HRC Turnford, and many others.



The boys were able to freely move around and meet and talk to many speakers, and discussed various

pathways into different and varied employments. They were able to take resources from each stand to help them consider a pathway.

Tesco were running a competition involving a short multi-choice answer quiz and as we were about to leave it was declared that Nathan had answered all the questions correctly and had won himself a £10 Tesco voucher.

We left the venue and made our way back to Hailey Hall, again by public transport.

YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE 27th JUNE – 1st JULY 2022 G86

For the first time in 2 years our Yr. 10 pupils were able to engage in **"Work Experience week"**.

Parents / carers were informed last October regarding the week and our pupils spoke with Rita French from 'Services for Young People' (SFYP) and myself, as to their work preferences and what they would like to do in the future regarding a possible career.

It was discussed with the pupils that Work Experience week was the 'experience of work', and not necessarily what was going to be their job when they left school.

Over the months Rita and her colleagues from SFYP went about finding placements for our pupils, taking into consideration where they lived and any assistance they may need in travel, either by family or by public transport. Some pupils had support in finding their own placements through family and contacts, and all safety checks and

visits were made to confirm suitability for our pupils.

In the weeks leading up to Work Experience week, pupils were taken to visit their placements and meet their employers. They got to see the venues, speak to the employers, and discuss expectations.

The week before starting I had arranged for Vivienne Davidson from Job Centre Plus (Gov.Uk-Works and Pensions Dept) to come into school and have a pre Work Experience week workshop and talk to the pupils regarding what employers were looking for, Soft Skills they may use or indeed learn, how to create a good first impression and that having a Work Experience week on their CV would be good in any future career pathway they may wish to take. If they had a good week it could also possibly lead to future employment with that particular company.

I kept all parents / carers informed and updated with relevant information. For pupils whom I thought may need extra support regarding anxiety or nerves, I encouraged them to keep a positive attitude for the week.

During the Work Experience week, pupils were visited by a member of Hailey Hall Staff to ensure they were ok and to discuss any concerns that they may have had. Photos were taken to put into the pupil's Logbook as a record of the placement.

Pupils' attendance was confirmed daily and I am proud to say there was **100% attendance for 10 / 11 pupils** over the week, with only one day that one pupil lost due to sickness. Credit goes to the pupils, and to their parents / carers for the support they gave at home.

When the pupils returned to school the following week, Vivienne from **Job Center plus** attended and gave a post "Work Experience" workshop to: discuss their week, how they found the experience, and to pass

on any funny stories to the other pupils. Certificates were given to all pupils for their achievement and engagement with Work Experience, to put on their file as a reminder of their time and something to look back on with fond memories when they are older.

Letters of thanks were sent to all the placements with a certificate of their involvement in Work Experience week with Hailey Hall pupils.

CURRICULUM CULTURAL DAY TRIPS

Yr 7 visit to PIZZA EXPRESS, Harlow GB 5

As part of Hailey Hall's on-going commitment to supporting our pupils regarding careers and education pathways, a visit to Pizza Express, Harlow was organised. On a warm July morning, the pupils got in the School taxis and were driven to Harlow Town, where we parked in a local carpark and walked to the venue.

On arrival at the Pizza Express we were met by Michelle, the Manager. She spoke a little about the history of the company; where pizza originated; the products used in the making, and had a little quiz on various vegetables that the company use. We were shown around the restaurant and the cooking areas.

The boys were impressed by the ovens and the fact they get extremely hot to enable the food to be cooked very quickly; a lot quicker than the boys have at home.

She spoke of employment opportunities at Pizza Express and what our pupils could look forward to in the future if they wished to gain employment in the short term, and what could possibly lead onto a management career pathway.

Then, what the boys had been waiting for, was the making of a basic pizza. They were each given a dough base, tomato puree and cheese, and shown the basic method of making a pizza. The boys were given individual numbers and these were placed on their creations to recognise their pizza when it was cooked.

After saying thank you to Michelle and her staff, the boys were able to sit outside in the dining area where they enjoyed the pizza, washed down with ice-cold water supplied by the store.

The boys returned to the taxis and back to Hailey Hall. They were a credit to themselves and the school. Well done!

Bletchley Park



Our Year 8s travelled to Bletchley Park as part of our cultural capital trips.

Whilst we were there our pupils were able to develop their knowledge of who Alan Turing was and his endeavours in helping to crack the Enigma code and defeat the Germans in World War 2.

It was impressive to see the conditions that the team worked in and it strengthened their knowledge about how the first basic computers were developed.

Bletchley Park is considered to be the birthplace of modern computing and is set in some incredibly restored historic houses. The exhibitions showed how some of the complex machinery was put together, which allowed the codebreakers to affect the outcome of WW2.

Our pupils were able to take part in some practical activities linked to codebreaking, as well as explore the grounds, including the garages and heritage tennis courts.

The Art and Design Technology departments took our year 7 boys to the Warner Bros. Studio in Watford for the Harry Potter Studio Tour.

The boys experienced aspects of the making of Harry Potter and were able to see how this process related to subjects such as art and design technology.


