## PRICE INCREASE FOR SCHOOL DINNERS FROM 1ST SEPTEMBER 2023

Due to rising costs in food prices, fuel (transportation) and utility bills, we are having to raise the cost of school dinners. With effect from 1<sup>st</sup> September 2023, the school meal will increase from £2.65 to £2.90 per meal. A letter has been sent out to all parents / carers informing them of this increase.

Parents who pay for school meals must pay on a weekly basis. We accept cash, cheque and online payments.

This change will not affect those who are entitled to free school meals. If you are unsure about

We are currently looking into different suppliers to reduce the cost of the uniform and we will inform you of any updates.

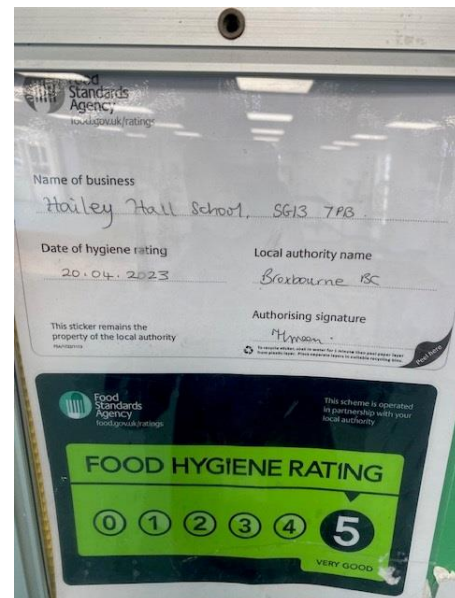
We now have a small selection of second-hand blazers, shirts and trousers, available for a small donation to the school.

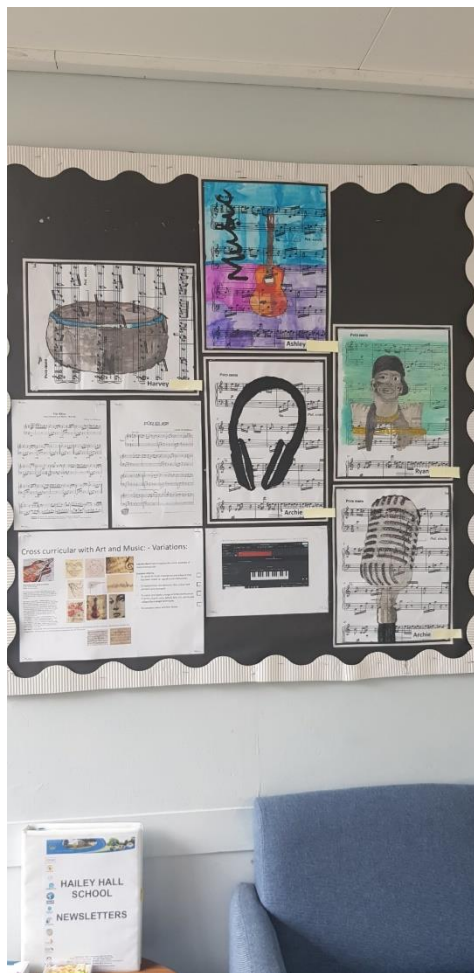
The school have been looking at parents' suggestions on improving the event, from location, noise and appointment systems, but overall the consensus was that it was a useful and positive evening.

Year 9 pupils boarded the Hailey Hall Minibus and taxi and went to the Computacenter in Hatfield.

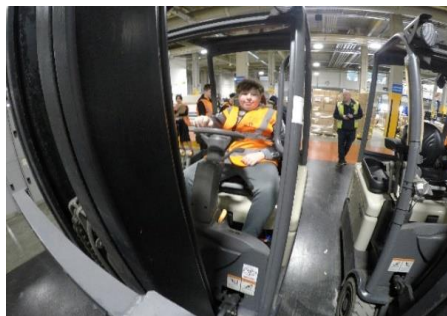
### Gatsby Benchmark 5, Encounters with Employers and Employees

Computacenter is a state-of-the-art venue that caters to many multi-national companies with its IT and support services. It has

offices all over the world, with its Head office in Hatfield.

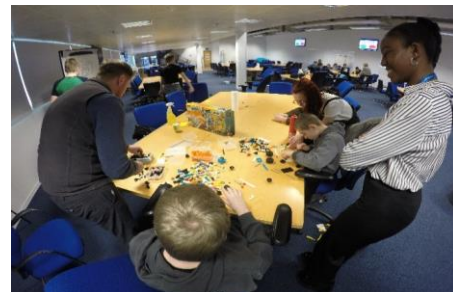
After initial discussions with both Renee and Craig who talked about their career pathways in the company, Renee - Languages and Craig - Sports, both are now involved in Future Talent and apprenticeships roles. This gave our pupils insight into how they could enter the company through various employment routes connected with IT and not necessarily from an IT background.

Our pupils were split into 2 groups and were shown around the buildings which have the largest automated warehouse in the country. The pupils saw many items of IT equipment being moved by machines and staff driving Forklift vehicles.



After lunch, the pupils were split into 3 groups. They were asked to use their imagination in designing a "Robot of the future" with emphasis on how it could support the future of mankind. The pupils had 30 minutes to work as a team designing and building a robot using large boxes of Lego.

The pupils discussed various designs, then worked together to build them.

### YEAR 10 VISIT TO GSK (Stevenage) 16<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2023



Year 10 pupils were taken by Hailey Hall transport to GSK in Stevenage. This is part of Hailey Hall's ongoing commitment to giving our pupils every opportunity to see what possible career pathways they may wish to consider in STEM subjects when they leave us.

### Gatsby Benchmark 5, Encounters with Employers and Employees

The following is a quote from the official GSK website,

"We are a science-led global healthcare company with a special purpose: to help people do more, feel better, and live longer. We have 3 global businesses that research, develop and manufacture innovative pharmaceutical medicines,

vaccines, and consumer healthcare products.”



We were met in reception by our hosts Davina, Emily, and Bimali, and we were issued identification badges.

We went to a function room where pupils were split into 2 groups for a tour of the facilities.



After a short tour in their groups each pupil worked in teams and engaged in the following activities:

1 - seeing how their hands are covered in bacteria even though they washed them. Their hands were covered in a special soap and then placed in a special blue light box that showed how dirty their hands were after several washes which surprised us all.

2 - a human skeleton was split into many Velcro parts; pupils worked as a team to put it together and complete it; the pupils used their science and sports knowledge and put it together successfully.

3 - they were given body organs that were not connected to put back in the right order and place.



4 - using pipettes and seeing how a scientist can perform many experiments in small trays with lots of different size trays with over 1000 holes. The pupils were given the chance to use different sizes and put liquid into the right tray sizes.



Davina spoke briefly to the pupils about career opportunities and possible career pathways post-16 in GSK.

### YEAR 8 VISIT TO HERTFORD FIRE AND RESCUE HEADQUARTERS 18<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2023



Year 8 pupils were taken by Hailey Hall transport to Hertford Fire and Rescue Service, Headquarters in Hertford.

On arrival, we were met by Andy Simpson who is the Watch Commander of White Watch, who was on duty at the time. We split into 2 groups and with their Fire fighters were shown a working fire tender and all the equipment it carries.

They gave examples of what situations they have dealt with and explained how the equipment worked.



Highlights of the visit were the pupils being able to try the water hoses, sit in the fire tender and put on the breathing apparatus, realising how heavy they are.







The officers explained their career and education pathways in becoming a Fire officer and in fact, one of the officers said that she started off being a teacher but decided on a career change and became a Fire fighter.

The pupils were well-behaved and asked relevant questions.

## ART CROSS CURRICULAR DAY 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2023

Art is a fantastic stimulus for work in all areas of the curriculum, enabling creative ways of working and opening unexpected avenues across subject areas. During our Art Cross Curriculum Day art was explored within subjects, with some fantastic results being generated by pupils.

Here are some examples:

English used a range of famous paintings such as Starry Night, The Persistence of Memory and The Lovers and the Weeping Woman as a starting point for a piece of creative writing.

We discussed art skills that link to different subject's careers pathways and chose one of the careers identified to explore further.

Year 10 did a focaccia art project; they made the bread in a previous lesson, and then used the lesson to construct a picture using vegetables.



Math's did a colour by number task based on the times tables worksheet.



PE looked at the new Olympic logos for each sport for Paris 2024 and identified some of the previous Olympiad's logos suggesting ones for activities we do here at Hailey Hall.

## YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE JUNE/JULY 2023

### Gatsby Benchmark 5 / 6

#### (5)-Encounters with employers and employees

#### (6)- Experience of the workplace

Our current Year 10 pupils engaged in work experience week during June and July. All parents / carers were contacted in January to discuss what this process involved and how best they could support their child.

Parents / carers / pupils were asked to consider finding 'their own placement' as this was historically found to be a favorable option. If pupils found a placement they were interested in and liked, they would engage with the process and enjoy the week.

Parents / carers were given the appropriate paperwork to complete and were offered support if it was needed, and I was available to be contacted to support the process.

They were given until the Easter holidays to decide which placement route they would prefer and to return the paperwork for me to process.

Working with Services for Young People (SFYP) based in Stevenage, we discussed the requirements to find placements and for those pupils who didn't require support the health & safety checks would be undertaken by them to make sure it was a safe and supported placement. For pupils who wanted support to find placements, this was undertaken by SFYP who had a database of companies to use and if no placements were found suitable, they would then consider the student's home details and make enquiries in trying to source a placement.

Once a placement was found the pupil would then be taken to visit and speak to the employer; all expectations were discussed, including clothing, timings, etc. and then the pupil would be good to start.

Due to placements not being able to support all the same week, the

Work Experience week was spread out from 26<sup>th</sup> June – 14<sup>th</sup> July.



Vivienne from Job Centre Plus (Works and Pensions department) came into Hailey Hall before the pupils started their Work Experience week to have a Pre WEX workshop where she discussed expectations from employers and good tips for our pupils to follow whilst at their placement.

The pupils would be monitored daily regarding attendance and most pupils were visited once on-site during their allotted week to make sure all was well and to discuss any problems.

Vivienne (JCP) also came into Hailey Hall after the pupils completed their WEX to discuss what they found useful and enjoyed about their placement and also to discuss some negative aspects that pupils may have found.

Engaging in work experience can be an enriching experience for Year 10 SEND pupils, providing them with valuable skills and personal development. Here are some essential skills that SEND pupils worked on during their work experience:



- Communication Skills
- Adaptability
- Time Management
- Problem-Solving
- Teamwork
- Initiative
- Independence
- Self-Advocacy
- Resilience
- Professionalism

Work experience is not only about specific job-related skills but also about personal growth and confidence-building. Providing a supportive and inclusive environment during work experience will allow Year 10 SEND pupils to gain valuable skills that can benefit them in various aspects of life.

student 5 - "I will not be looking at working in an office in the future".

A particular comment from an employer was very pleasing; "I will admit I have been pleasantly surprised, they were keen to undertake tasks and completed them to a good standard. They have worked well alongside staff as well as working to complete tasks on their own. They have been polite and chatty, and the pupil's mother has said this is quite unusual so I would like to say, all in all, it has been a good week".

A good week was had by all and we are looking forward to next Year's 10 work experience week in July 2024.

### PIZZA EXPRESS HARLOW 5<sup>TH</sup> JULY 2023



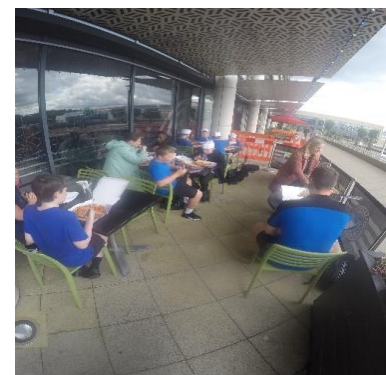
As part of Hailey Hall's ongoing commitment to supporting our pupils with possible future career pathways in retail and food, our Year 7's were taken to the Pizza Express Restaurant in Harlow.

### (Gatsby Benchmark 5 – Encounters with employers and employees)

Pupils were taken by school transport to a local Harlow car park and then walked to the venue. The venue was closed to the public. We were met by the duty manager, Michelle, who took us all to the main dining area and spoke to the pupils about the company and its origins. She then talked about the history of pizzas and where it originated. She showed the pupils different ingredients used in pizzas and fascinating facts that got the pupils thinking about food; how a pizza is made, and where they get their produce from. She discussed possible career opportunities and that Pizza Express employ many young people to cook and serve food in the restaurant both in front of house and behind the scenes, and who, in some cases, go on to be managers.

Pupils were told about the importance of hygiene when handling food and were asked to wash their hands in store toilets before they touched any food. The manager showed them how to make a pizza with basic dough and toppings and asked them to try to make a pizza themselves. They were given 2 full platters of toppings used on a pizza and asked to try something they may have not tasted before. The pupils tucked in and cleared their plates, many saying it was the first time they had tasted certain items of food. They were shown the large ovens that cooked the pizzas very quickly. Michelle explained the difference between the home oven and a Pizza Express oven; basically Pizza Express ovens can

cook a pizza in 6 mins at 400 degrees which is needed in a restaurant; a lot faster than at home.



The pupils asked relevant questions and were well behaved and a credit to themselves and Hailey Hall School.

## HENRY MOORE FOUNDATION TRIP 12<sup>TH</sup> JULY 2023



Year 9 pupils who have opted to undertake AQA GCSE Art, Craft and Design in September and the current year 10 Art pupils were taken to The Henry Moore Foundation in Much Hadham on the 12<sup>th</sup> July 2023.

Pupils experienced Henry Moore's artwork first hand and had the opportunity to make sketches directly from the artist's work, or capture photographic images using DSLR cameras. Pupils enjoyed the experience and had the opportunity to listen to the guide who took them on a tour around the grounds and into the studio. Pupils were able to gain an insight as to why the artist worked the way that he did and what it was that provided him with inspiration for his sculptures.



## ENTERPRISE TEAM (BISCUITS) VISIT TO FOXHOLES CARE HOME, HITCHIN 13<sup>TH</sup> JULY 2023

### GB4 (Linking careers to the curriculum)

### GB 5 (Encounters with Employers and Employees)

During the past academic year, Hailey Hall has been in an Enterprise project, in partnership with Foxholes Care Home in Hitchin. This is as a result of a conversation with Neeti whose family owns and runs Foxholes, and myself. She very kindly offered to support an Enterprise project which involved pupils from Hailey Hall making plain

shortbread and Choc chip shortbread biscuits and selling them at the care home for their restaurant. The care home has many family members and visitors that use the facilities and often have small snacks in the gardens.



With support from Shelley Long (Food Tech), she has encouraged pupils to attend an enrichment club on a Wednesday and to make biscuits.

The pupils learn about the ingredients that are required, the correct way to weigh out the recipe, how to order ingredients, how to pack, use a vacuum sealer and discuss how they are transported; the journey of a biscuit from simple flour to being eaten by a customer. This enables pupils to understand the chain of events in making biscuits to sell them for a profit.

The biscuits are sold for £2 per packet (2 biscuits in each bag) Then the care home is invoiced accordingly by Hailey Hall's school finance office. All profits go towards the Food Tech department buying extra resources to be used by other pupils at the school, such as for Food Hygiene courses at both Level 1 and Level 2.



On Thursday 13th July 2023 four pupils, with Shelley Long and myself, boarded the school minibus and made our way to the care home in Hitchin.

On arrival we were met by Neeti who showed us around the care home and facilities. The care home is spread over 4 floors and each floor is independent regarding various lounges, restaurants, bathrooms, medical facilities, and communal rooms. It has large well-manicured gardens with wheelchair access, Stables with horses adjacent to the gardens, free-range chickens that they are able to sell free-range eggs to visitors, a library (with a full-size Pool table), a Hair salon, and specially adapted bathrooms with winches to help less able residents to be able to bath safely. We were shown a typical room with fitted wardrobes, a motorised bed to adjust as appropriate, an En-suite Shower room, and Toilet facilities.

A Zumba class was going on as a Morning activity in the main hall and Shelley and myself were encouraged to take part which we gladly did to the embarrassment of our pupils.

The boys were offered a refreshing drink in the library where Neeti explained the history of the home and plans for extensions in the future. With an aging population, there will be

more need for such homes. She discussed possible employment routes into hers and many other care homes. They have a full-time staff of over 80 people and there are about 40 people on-site at any one time doing many varied jobs that are needed to run a successful Care Home.

There are about 80 residents currently in the home with the youngest in their early 70s and the eldest, a resident of 106.

At the end of the visit, the highlight for the pupils was being given unlimited access to the ice cream parlour and the pupils were able to help themselves to ice cream cones and toppings.

When it was time to leave the pupils gave their thanks to Neeti and the staff. They were well-behaved and a credit to Hailey Hall. We returned to Hailey Hall and the pupils continued on their timetables.

Thanks to Neeti and Shelley regarding the success of this project and we look forward to continuing our partnership in the next Academic year.

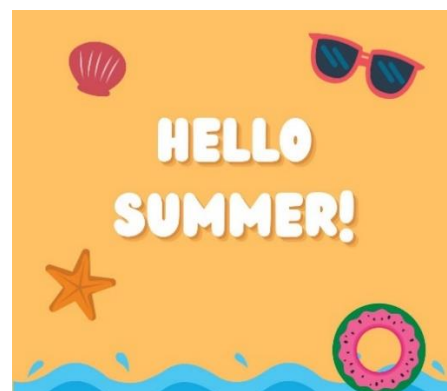
